# Proclamation

## Whereas:

Today we recognize the 156<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Juneteenth with the focus on the importance of calling attention to and celebrating Juneteenth as one of the critical turning points for the United States, instead of a footnote in history; and

**WHEREAS:** President Abraham Lincoln signed the Emancipation Proclamation on January 1, 1863, declaring the slaves in Confederate territory free, paving the way for the passing of the 13<sup>th</sup> Amendment which formally abolished slavery in the United States of America; and

**WHEREAS:** Word about the signing of the Emancipation Proclamation was delayed some two and a half years, to June 19, 1865 when Major General Gordon Granger arrived in Galveston, Texas and announced in the town square that all slaves were free; and

**WHEREAS:** The newly freed men and women rejoiced in the streets with jubilant celebrations, and thus, the Juneteenth holiday was born; and

**WHEREAS:** Emancipation Day observations are held on different days in different states throughout the United States; and

**WHEREAS:** June 19<sup>th</sup> has a special meaning to African-Americans, and is called "JUNETEENTH" combining the words June and Nineteenth, and has been celebrated by the African-American community for over 150 years; and

**NOW THEREFORE:** I, David J. Berger, Mayor of the City of Lima, Ohio do hereby proclaim June 19<sup>th</sup> as

### JUNETEENTH

in Lima, Ohio encourage all citizens to become more aware of the significance of this celebration in African-American history and in the heritage of our nation and City.
